RE: 95th IATTC Annual Meeting Position Statement

Dear Taiwan Fisheries Agency,

The submission of this letter and subsequent position statement is regarding the <u>Fishery Improvement Project</u> (FIP) currently being undertaken by the Pacific Ocean Tuna Longline fishery. The fishery targets albacore (*Thunnus alalunga*) and catches bigeye (*T. obesus*) and yellowfin (*T. albacares*). The pelagic longline vessels are flagged to China and Vanuatu and fish on the high seas in the Pacific. The fishery is managed regionally by the Western and Central Pacific Fisheries Commission (WCPFC) in the Western and Central Pacific Ocean (WCPO) and by the Inter American Tropical Tuna Commission (IATTC) in the Eastern Pacific Ocean (EPO). This FIP aims to meet the rising global demand for tuna in a sustainable manner by assuring catches do not exceed sustainable levels, promoting the ecosystem-based approach to fisheries management and strengthening policy and governance systems in the region. The end goal is to achieve certification under the Marine Stewardship Council Fisheries Standard by 2024.

As part of this FIP reaching MSC certification there are various actions which need to be undertaken which involve a range of different stakeholders. To ensure the FIP meets these objectives we need the support of the Flag states to advocate during the 95th annual IATTC meeting to urge action on multiple topics laid out below. To see these actions in further detail, please see the position statement available on the Fishery Progress FIP page sent on behalf of all the FIP participants to IATTC.

As a flag state, it is important that the following is adequately advocated for during the IATTC meeting in 2020 and we ask for you to make sure the following asks are raised:

- Ask 1: Adopt harvest strategies including reference points for North Pacific Albacore, that
 have clearly defined harvest control rules and monitoring mechanisms (Action 1.2 and 1.3 in
 FIP workplan)
- Ask 2: Adopt measures to mitigate the incidental catch and maximise the post-release survival
 of sensitive fauna, such as sharks, mobulid rays, birds, sea turtles, particularly leatherback sea
 turtles, and promote additional research on mobulids, including post-release survival,
 genetics and population studies, as recommended by the IATTC Staff, Bycatch Working Group
 and IATTC SAC. (Action 2.1 in FIP workplan).
- Ask 3: Improve monitoring in all tuna fisheries (see MCS) (Action 2.1 in FIP workplan)
- Ask 4: Take immediate steps to enforce the existing shark finning resolution and strengthen it
 by requiring that all sharks be landed with fins naturally attached. (Action 2.1 in FIP workplan)



- Ask 5: Require 100% observer coverage (human and/or electronic) for longline vessels, and all vessels engaged in at-sea transshipment, within 4 years. (Action 2.1 in FIP action plan)
- Ask 6: Adopt best practice E-Monitoring and E-Reporting standards, including for logbooks for purse seine vessels. (Action 2.1 in FIP action plan)
- Ask 7: Disclose Resolution plans to address identified area of non-compliance (Action 3.4 in FIP action plan)
- Ask 8: Require members to submit a compliance action plan (Action 3.4 in FIP action plan)
- Ask 9: Adopt audit points or reference metrics for IATTC measures to ensure clarity in members obligations, reporting requirements, etc., and what will be addressed in the Review Committee. (Action 3.4 in FIP action plan)
- Ask 10: Make public annex 1, under IATTC Res C-11-07 (resolution on the process for improved compliance of resolutions adopted by the commission), The Standard Questionnaire on Compliance with IATTC Resolutions once it has been completed by participating CPCs, to ensure CCM's are implementing their obligations. (Action 3.4 in FIP action plan)


